Read: Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass, an American Slave by Frederick Douglass

(This book can be found in the iBookstore for FREE)

Assignment:

Throughout the narrative Douglass makes several important points over and over. As you read the narrative **take notes** about each of these topics. Include quotes, insights, personal reflections, and questions. (*Helpful hint*: annotate in your book in different colors to help quickly locate information on these points later on).

- 1. Justice for slaves (and all men of color) is different from justice for whites
- 2. No one can be enslaved if she or he has the ability to read, write, and think
- 3. Slaves were treated no better than, sometimes worse than, livestock
- 4. By encouraging depravity men come to learn to hate freedom
- 5. The Christianity of the slaveholders is hypocritical and used to justify their actions
- 6. White men fear that men of color will steal their jobs if they are educated and learn how to perform the job

When you are finished reading the autobiography chose 4 of these points to discuss in short written responses. Each response should be 2-3 typed paragraphs in length and site specific passages in the text (no 1 citation/anecdote should appear more than once). Your response should attempt to summarize what Douglass is attempting to convey to the reader and also your own understanding from the reading.

Use <u>in-text citations</u> when you are citing a quote or paraphrased passage from the book. For this work the citations would look like this: (Douglass 57) with the number representing the page (note: page numbers will differ depending on the version and medium of your book).
